
Pastor's Corner

Sports League Gives Kids Opportunity

About ten years ago, church members felt a call to open our athletic facilities for children in our neighborhood. Dwight Crain, a longtime coach, said that this ministry began by "look[ing] for things the neighborhood kids liked to do, so soccer was the first thing we started doing." It soon became obvious that there was also a high demand for basketball in our community. The goal for this ministry is to try to share Christ's love through sports and to let families know they're welcome at FBC Waco. Crain mentioned that making the league

affordable has always been a priority. For \$10, a child gets a full athletic season and a jersey. Our sports leagues have become a staple for many families around our church and throughout greater Waco. In Fall 2012, over 225 children played in our soccer league. "We are always pushing at the end to get enough coaches," Crain said. We'd love for you and your family to be involved. Dress and Bless Provides Uniforms

The community ministry, Dress and Bless, provides new school uniforms for children in the immediate neighborhood of First Baptist Church. Wearing new school clothes on the first day of school can give these children a much-needed sense of excitement and self-confidence. Each August, church members have the opportunity to purchase uniforms for a specific child. They are also asked to commit to pray for that child by name throughout the year. Each child receives

a card telling them that they are being prayed for by the donor. Volunteers are needed for this ministry in the areas of publicity, sign-ups, organizing donations and assisting with the purchase of new uniforms. Remember when you were in your early adult years and just getting started? Money was limited and you realized you had nothing with which to fill your humble home. Most graduate students come to Waco from out of town, and many of these students are no longer living under the financial support of their parents. Dan Hull noticed this need and started a program at First Baptist called furnishings@first. furnishings@first collects gently-used home furnishings from

church and community members and loans them out to graduate students for the duration of their studies in Waco. When students leave Waco, they may return the furniture to be loaned out again. furnishings@first asks for furniture donations twice a year to give back to the collegiate community. FBC Partners with Others at Gospel Café

The Gospel Café, a ministry begun in South Waco about 15 years ago by the CrossTies Ecumenical Church, serves lunch from 11:30-1:30 to all who come each Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The lunch is on a pay-if-you-can basis, freeing the guests (generally about 200 people) from feeling as if they are receiving a hand-out. During the lunch time, the Gospel Café is a melting pot of cultures. Members of First Baptist Waco have been involved with this ministry

since its inception and currently provide all the support for the meal on the last Friday of each month, relieving the regular Friday staff. In addition, First Baptist receives non-perishable food items for the café on the months the calendar has a fifth Sunday. Agape Ministry Provides Meal Every Month

The Agape Meal ministry for the low-income community of Waco occurs on the last Tuesday of each month. The Agape meal provides comforting food, fellowship and a worship service. Jim and Peggy Hudson helped start this ministry. "This meal is like their own church service," Jim said when describing the impact the Agape Meal has on the homeless. Building relationships with this community has opened doors for FBC Waco members to continue these friend-

ships in the community. Jim and Peggy said that many volunteers are hesitant to sit at a table to facilitate the conversation. However, once they try it, they see God working at their table and are thankful for the opportunity to be a part of something bigger than themselves. Meals and Wheels Delivers Food to Elderly and Disabled Each Week

Meals and Wheels is a local nonprofit and supported by several churches serving meals to those who are home-bound. However, cooked meals are just the beginning of this ministry. Meals and Wheels provides transportation, pet food, groceries and a senior center where relationships can be made. All of these areas are enriching the lives of homebound adults in Waco. Members of First Baptist participate in this city-wide ministry by taking a delivery route to bring prepared meals

to several families at a time. Donations of food or help with delivering meals are one of the greatest areas of need for this ministry. This is a well-established organization, and a great way to help serve the Waco community. LIFT Workshops for Low Income Families in Transition

After encountering the struggles of hardworking single parents trying to work and raise children, several members of FBC founded the LIFT Workshop. LIFT's primary focus is to efficiently and effectively facilitate services to low income families and individuals in our community. LIFT's ultimate goal is to assist families to achieve economic viability and lessened dependence on government assistance. LIFT serves and draws attention to an invisible and underserved population of minimum wage earning families who are struggling to make ends meet.

LIFT workshops are held once a year, spring and fall. They provide a "one stop shop" for working poor families who need the services of multiple agencies but cannot leave work or cannot lose work hours to visit these agencies. Approximately 36 nonprofits and government agencies, as well as TSTC and MCC, participate in LIFT workshops. Each workshop attendee is paired with an advocate at the workshop to evaluate the attendee's needs, to walk alongside the attendee at the workshop and to develop a plan to help the attendee achieve econom-

ic viability and lessened dependency goals. This personalized assistance is essential to ensure that each attendee receives the full benefit of the workshop and the services provided. LIFT is one of the most rewarding ministries of FBC Waco because it facilitates personal relationships between advocates and the families served.

Class Builds Ramps for Service Project

Dr. Jeter Basden's Adult IV Sunday School class has been building ramps now for almost a decade. They started when a local ministry sought assistance repairing homes of people who were elderly or disabled. Since then, it has been transformed into a ministry that builds ramps for disabled people on a monthly to quarterly basis. The ministry starts early on Saturday mornings, sometimes going well into the afternoon. The class partners with Habitat for Humanity, which provides the lumber, tools and building plans for the ramps. If you were to

ask any of the class members what they enjoy the most about this ministry, they would probably tell you it is the ability to help someone in need while demonstrating their skills in carpentry.

Most of the members wish they could do bigger projects, and if more members from FBC got involved they would be able to extend their ministry to other home repair projects and perhaps a home construction project. She wants women to get more involved with the purpose of the ministry, to provide a nurturing Christ-centered environment fostering personal, professional, and spiritual growth. "I wish it could be expanded," Griffis said, noting additional avenues for service. For example, women could get involved as journey partners who partner with the women in the organi-

zation and schedule a weekly meeting of one hour. A Journey Partner would be there to pray, encourage, and be an accountability partner for the women going through the program. "Serving a meal is level one for them, they need people to be more committed," Griffis added. Her vision for this ministry goes far beyond serving a meal twice a semester. Annual Mission Trip to Guatemala

Since 2003, First Baptist Waco has sent teams annually to minister along-side the staff of Fundacion Salvacion, an orphanage in Huehuetenango, Guatemala.
