## GREETINGS AND JAK SE MÁŠ,

As we move into the second quarter of 2014, two things come to mind. Spring storms are always a possibility in Texas and the 29th RVOS General Convention is right around the corner in June.

We have certainly seen our share of unpredictable and erratic weather and non-weather related events such as tornados, major hail storms, explosions and wildfires the past few years. While no one wants to have unexpected damage to their homes, RVOS has been and will continue to be there for our membership in their time of need as we stand behind our neighbors helping neighbors philosophy. Always be mindful to take cover and heed weather advisories. Mother nature can be deadly as well as unforgiving, so be prepared.

Now is also a good time to inspect and perform some necessary maintenance to your property that could help prevent an untimely loss. Dwellings that are well maintained are known to have fewer claims which is the primary driver of the amount of premium each of us pay for our home insurance coverage. Some examples of items that could prevent damage are having your air condition unit serviced and the condensation line cleaned out, check or replace the water supply lines to your clothes washing machine, having a chimney sweep clean

out your fireplace and be sure to install smoke detectors or check and replace the batteries in existing ones. Make sure trees and shrubs are trimmed away from the dwelling and replace any broken or missing shingles to prevent interior leaks. If your roof is showing signs of age such as cracked, worn or curling shingles, it may be time to consider replacing it. A little prevention now could help you avoid a much bigger problem later.

The RVOS General Convention will be held in Waco, Texas, on June 22 and 23 at the Convention Center. Delegates and their alternates to the Convention were elected at the annual Local Lodge meetings last year with credential documents being forwarded to the Home Office. Registration, new delegate orientation and a welcome reception will be held on June 22. Role call and seating of the delegates will take place the morning of June 23.

The By-Law Committee met in January and March as directed in the RVOS By-Laws to review financial statements and By-Law change recommendations. The recommended changes submitted to the By-Law Committee are published in this edition of the Rolník. These will be reviewed and deliberated by the delegates and new By-Laws will be adopted. The seven districts will meet following the

Convention to determine a location where their district meetings will be held beginning in 2015. Districts will meet in pre-determined year election cycles non-concurrent with the Convention to elect district directors and their alternates in addition to a By-Law Committee representative and an alternate.

## **NEW \$25 POLICY PROCESSING FEE AND LATE FEE**

The RVOS Board of Directors approved a \$25 policy processing fee that will apply to all policies. This fee will now be included as part of the overall cost involved in offering you valuable coverage and in the production of your insurance

Adoption of the policy fee was determined by the Board to be a better alternative to rate increases to protect the Company from the cost of increased losses in 2013.

When you pay your insurance premium by the due date, you are helping to keep the overall cost of your policy more affordable and saving yourself some money in doing so. If your payment is not received by the due date, a chain of events occur that not only increase the Company expense ratio, but also costs you in additional late fees and places continuation of your insurance coverage in jeopardy.

You will be charged a \$25 late fee per policy to help cover the additional costs incurred to execute the Notice, Withdrawal of Cancellation, and underwriting review process required on each policy.

Each Delegate must attend the Convention. He or she will receive mileage from his or her home to the Convention and back and daily pay for the time lost because of attendance at the Convention. If it is impossible for the Delegate to attend the Convention it is the duty of the Alternate to fill the vacancy. Delegates to be paid by check the week following the Convention.

### SECTION 6

Each Delegate must present proper credentials at the Convention signed by the Local Lodge President and Secretary, or must prove in some other manner that he or she was duly elected.

## LODGE BY-LAW RECOMMENDATIONS

#### LODGE 108

On Oct. 6, 2013, Lodge 108 passed a motion to submit the following By-Law recommendations for the 2014 convention:

## • Article XI, Section 2 (B)

No Officer of any other fire or extended coverage insurance company, and no Officer of any Local Lodge of any other fire, lightning or extended coverage insurance company can be on the By-Law or Screening Committee or any Alternate to such committee or member of the Board. If after being elected to any of the previously named position, he or she should become an Officer as herein mentioned, he or she automatically resigns from that position. This section does not apply if this Association owns all or any part of the stock of such company, or if such By-Law Committee member or Alternate, Screening Committee member or Alternate, or member of the Board or Alternate becomes an officer of another fire and extended coverage company by way of agreement(s) entered into between this Association, it's subsidiary(s) or affiliated and such other fire and extended coverage company.

The Board of Directors By-Law recommendations for the 2014 Convention are published below. Changes are indicated with a strike through, additions are indicated in bold. **GENERAL CHANGES** 

Any occurence of the phrase "RVOS Farm Mutual Insurance" be changed to "RVOS Farm Mutual Insurance **Company**."

Any occurence of the phrase "Board" or "Directors" be changed to "Board of Directors."

Remove all ocurrences of "Revised by Referendum effective 8/1/2012."

These By-Laws were unanimously adopted by the Twenty-eighth **ninth** Convention of RVOS Farm Mutual Insurance **Company** on the 29th 23rd day of June, 2010 2014 at Galveston-Waco, Texas.

#### **ARTICLE I - NAME**

Section 1. The letters "RVOS" **are the acronym and** represent the first letters of the original Czech name of this Association. The Czech spelling is as follows: Rolnický Vzájemnê Ochranný Spolek, which translated means Farmers Mutual Protective Association.

#### **ARTICLE II - OBJECT**

Section 1. (c) However, should such procedures prove fruitless or if such procedures are rejected, venue in all cases other than federal action against the Association which are brought by the member or the member's representative or any party insured or claiming coverage under or through any contract of insurance issued by this Association shall be vested and must originate in the District Court of Bell County, Texas:

#### **ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP**

Section 2. (a) (Each Delegate, Alternate Delegate or **Lodge** Officer must have a policy in the Delegate's, Alternate Delegate's or **Lodge** Officer's own name in order to have a vote, and to be eligible to represent the Local Lodge serve as a Delegate or Alternate Delegate to the Convention for the Local Lodge.

Section 5. Any misrepresentation by any named insured as defined in the contract of insurance or any violation or noncompliance with any part of the contract of insurance by any named insured automatically cancels, ab initio the insurance coverage provided by the contract of insurance **from the inception date**.

#### **ARTICLE VII - PREMIUMS**

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Section 1. (b) If **a** members² premium is not received by the due date the policy will be cancelled in accordance with the policy provisions and applicable law.

(g) The Local Lodge remuneration is classified as  ${\bf a}$  deduction from revenue.

#### **ARTICLE IX - ADDITIONAL OBLIGATIONS ...**

Section 2. (b) If a member sells insured property, the policy is cancelled **at the time of sell**.

Section 4. (b) If a member moves an insured building **from a described location** such building must be inspected within tendays after any such removal or transfer. **is no longer insured.** 

(d) The adjuster must promptly report to the Home Office whether the residue is insurable.

Section 6. Delete the entire section. Move all subsequent section numbers up one place.

#### **ARTICLE X - LOCAL LODGES**

Section 1. (c) A Local Lodge may not disband without permission from the Board, and then only if **they must present** all of its books, papers and assets <del>are delivered</del> to the Home Office.

Section 8. Duties of the Local Lodge ... , and sign a bond equal to the maximum amount of Local Lodge funds.

Section 10. Delete the entire section. Move all subsequent section numbers up one place.

Section 11. All correspondence with the Home Office should be in the Czech language, if possible.

#### **ARTICLE XI - THE BOARD**

Section 1. (c) This Association is divided into seven Districts composed of the following counties in the State of Texas, wherein regular meetings of Local Lodges are held in the domiciled county of each Lodge. A map on display at the Home Office designates the individual District boundaries. Delete everything in (c) below this sentence.

Section 2. (b) No Agent or Officer of any other fire or extended coverage insurance company, and no Officer of any Local Lodge of any other fire, lightning or extended coverage insurance company can be on the By-Law or Screening Committee or any Alternate to such committees or member of the Board of Directors or Alternate Director ... This section does not apply if this Association owns all or any part of the stock of such company, or if such By-Law Committee member or Alternate, Screening Committee member or Alternate, or member ... it's subsidiary(s) or affiliated affiliates ...

Section 3. (a) They assume the duties of their respective office in the January meeting succeeding the Convention **or District meeting.** 

(c) In the event a District Director **or By-law Committee member** cannot attend a called Board **of Directors or By-law Committee** meeting, the Alternate Director **or Alternate By-law Committee member** shall be notified to attend in order to insure representation of such District.

## ARTICLE XII - DUTIES OF THE HOME OFFICE OFFICERS

Add to the end of the article title "and District Directors."

Section 4. The Board has the authority to authorize the Adjusters to write checks and pay claims up to the amount set by the Board.

Section 6. (b) Each District Director must visit every Local Lodge, or at least one Local Lodge Officer of every Local Lodge in his **/ her** District at least once during his term and as requested by the President or Vice-President.

Move Section 6. from Article XII to Article XI. Make Sections 7. (a),(b), and (c).

Section 7. Move (a) and (b) to Article XI and make Section 8. (a) and (b). Move (c) and make Section 6. in Article XII. Move (d) to Article XI and make Section 8. (c). Move (g) to Article XI and make Section 8. (d). Move (h) to Article XI and make Section 8. (e).

(c) The Board shall contract with a publisher for the publishing of TEXAS FARMER (TEXASKY ROLNIK).

(f) The Board, by majority vote, will authorize the appointment of Adjusters, define their duties, and adjust their salaries and their travel expenses.

Section 10. – All Board members, Officers, Adjusters and Directors of the Board of Directors must deliver to their successors all money, books and other property belonging to this Association.

Move Sections 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 to Article XI and make Sections 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

#### **ARTICLE XIV - CONVENTION**

Section 3. Where there are is more **than one** Delegates from one Local Lodge, the Delegates divide the votes equally.

Section 5. – Each **To be a** Delegate **you** must attend the Convention **and be seated as a Delegate** ... If it is impossible for the Delegate to attend the Convention it is the duty of the Alternate to fill the vacancy **and attend the Convention**. Delegates **are** to be paid by check the week following the Convention.

Section 8. The By-Law, Salary and Credentials Committee will serve to January 1st following the Convention, with the same duties as outlined in Article Section 8 this section.

Section 16. – These By-Laws become effective November 1, <del>2010</del> **2014**.

Sidney Kacir, RVOS Attorney from 1973-1998, has attended six conventions and been given the title of Honorary Attorney. Kacir said that more than anything the conventions have demonstrated that the members of RVOS were concerned about the direction of the company.

The first RVOS convention was held in 1904 in Ocker, Texas. Since then there have been over 47 conventions.

"There are a lot of resemblances between the early RVOS conventions and the political conventions these days ... people were very emotional and very set in their ways," Kacir said.

Kacir said the conventions have helped shape policy provisions, types of coverage and premiums.

"So many of the old-timers were so technical," Kacir said. "They would spend hours debating about things like how many gallons

of gasoline you could have in a garage."

One of the most important conventions was held in 1974 in Temple, Texas, Kacir

said. "The adding of the extended coverage was a turning point at RVOS. At the 1974 convention so much time was spent on sea level, elevation and wind," he said.

Kacir said the RVOS conventions have provided a way for members to strengthen the company. "One of the strengths of the organization is having people who feel strongly, who care and who will jump in there," Kacir said.

#### PATHWAYS TO LEADERSHIP

With the sunlight casting off his cowboy hat and dust tumbling out across a prairie outside San Angelo, Texas, Ludwig "Luddy" Havlak throws another bucket of feed to his sheep. The sheep herd in close to him, stacking more billows of dust up into the air.

In many ways Havlak embodies the small farmer that RVOS has always considered their neighbor.

Havlak said he started sheep herding at

the age of 17. "In 1924 my dad bought this place between Rowena and Ballinger and built a home. This neighbor of mine was raising sheep, and so I worked for him and every month he gave me a sheep."

In 1942 Havlak enlisted with the Air Force, where he served as a radar operator in over 40 combat missions over the South Pacific.

Havlak has served with RVOS as Lodge 17
Secretary, District 5 Director, and ByLaw Committee member for over 40 years.
"I didn't have any insurance before I got married, so we got insurance with RVOS in 1953," Havlak said.

It wasn't until 1965 when Havlak attended his first lodge meeting that he was elected as the secretary for the lodge.

Havlak served in that position until the 1974 convention, when he was elected as the District 5 Director.

"I enjoyed [the convention] very much. That's the only reason I wanted to get involved," Havlak said.

Kacir and Havlak were both elected to their positions at the 1974 convention. In 1998, after both had left their positions at RVOS, they were given honorary titles.

#### A FAMILY AFFAIR

Sidney Kacir's uncle George Kacir served as the RVOS Attorney for 40 years before Sidney Kacir. "[George Kacir] was one of the community leaders in West. He was former city commissioner, former city attorney, and served as mayor of West for more than 20 years," Sidney Kacir said.

Sidney Kacir said that among other things George Kacir helped organize the Texas Association of Mutual Insurance Companies, was a volunteer firefighter and a bank teller.

George Kacir started as the RVOS Insurance Attorney because most of the existing insurance companies didn't want to provide coverage to small farmers, Sidney Kacir said. George Kacir saw the need for his neighbors, who were mostly farmers, to get coverage.

From generation to generation uncles, sons and daughters, cousins and close friends have served together at RVOS conventions. When insurance is passed down the duty to serve is often passed down with it.

Another RVOS legacy is Reta Slavik Chandler, President of the Texas Czech Heritage and Culture Center. Her uncle Jos Slavik served as the Treasurer and Secretary for RVOS from 1930-1967.

"He did not drive a car. From his house on 1st Street he walked to work in downtown Temple where the RVOS office was located," Chandler said.

#### LOOKING FORWARD

Havlak said new generations looking for insurance get a packaged deal, or they go on-line.

Havlak said membership in his lodge has decreased over the last ten years, but he is confident that the RVOS conventions have provided RVOS the opportunity to grow and change in ways that other insurance companies haven't been able to.

Sidney Kacir said, "as time goes on RVOS is going to have to continue to grow, adapt and adjust because things are changing."


Kacir said the main advantage of conventions is that they allow the association to grow. "It's a constant changing and adapting," he said.

"Everything always changed [at the conventions]. It has to change if it wants to keep going," he said.

#### EASY WOOD STAIN

### 1 gal Apple Cider or White Vinegar 4 pads Steel Wool

This easy do-it-yourself project takes a few days to set up, but produces a rustic stain that will give your wood an aged and rugged appearance without actually aging the wood.

Step 1. Mix steel wool and vinegar in a 1-2 gallon disposable container.

Step 2. For a light stain, let the container sit in a venilated area for 2-3 days. For a dark stain, let the container sit for 4-5 days. The longer the mixture sits, the darker the stain.

Step 3. Sand the wood to be stained. Use course sandpaper for a more-aged look.

Step 4. Brush the stain liberally onto the wood until fully penetrated.

Step 5. Let wood dry completely, repeat steps 3 and 4 for a darker appearance.

Step 6. Optional: apply a wood finisher and polish.
